Dear Chairman Wicker, Ranking Member Cantwell and Senator Blumenthal:

Thank you for your leadership in introducing the HOT CARS Act of 2019 (S. 1601) on May 22, 2019. As family members who have lost our children or had a near miss in a hot car incident, we appreciate your concern and compassion.

We are writing to request that S. 1602 be amended and enacted into law so that the safety standard requires not only an alert system, but also a detection system. As you are aware, there have been significant advances in the development of technology to detect the presence of even a tiny newborn left behind in a vehicle. Last September, several of us traveled to Washington, DC to attend a demonstration held outside of the Senate Dirksen Office Building showcasing state-of-the-art child detection systems. Additionally, we had an opportunity to meet with many of your staff who were also impressed with the current technology.

In light of the availability of innovative technology, we strongly urge you to advance an amended bill that will significantly enhance the protection of children and hopefully eliminate these tragic deaths. This can be accomplished by enacting legislative language included in H.R. 2, the Moving Forward Act., This bill is now under consideration by the U.S. House of Representatives and will likely be voted on soon.

The provision in H.R. 2 directs the U.S. Department of Transportation to issue a safety standard within two years that would require every new car be equipped with technology that both "detects" the presence of a child in a vehicle and "informs" the driver and others within the vicinity of the vehicle.

Unfortunately, a simple reminder alert to check the back seat, as required by S. 1601, falls short of providing the effective and comprehensive solution that is needed to prevent hot car tragedies. In fact, we are very concerned that this type of outdated and incomplete system will give parents a false sense of security. Since the Senate bill was first introduced in 2017, manufacturers have made tremendous progress in developing more sophisticated and accurate technology to identify the presence of a small child or baby. And, the cost is extremely economical and likely will be even more inexpensive when it is standard equipment in all new cars similar to other technologies required such as rearview cameras. Furthermore, a system that "detects" the

presence of a child will also address the problem of children who climb into unoccupied vehicles, representing over 25 percent of the identified hot car fatalities annually.

Unfortunately, educational efforts over the last 20 years have not been effective. While public awareness of the issue is at an all-time high, so is the number of children dying. The last two years (2018, 2019) were the worst years in history for children dying in hot cars with over 100 little lives lost. These children do not have to die. Families do not have to live with the unbearable pain that we feel every day.

We come to you with great urgency to support language in H.R. 2. Already this week another child died in a hot car in Virginia. Every day that we delay in advancing these life-saving detection technologies means children are at risk of needlessly dying. We desperately need a legislative solution that will solve the problem and want to work with you to achieve that goal before another summer passes.

We wanted to make sure you saw the article that ran in the New York Times on 6/26/2020 (Momentum for an Effort to Save Children From Sweltering Cars) that discusses the need for technology.
